Argentina and Chile | Oct. 3-13, 2025





The Lutheran churches of Latin America and the Caribbean have heard the cry of the poor. A minority denomination in an overwhelmingly Roman Catholic region, these churches have responded to that cry with a holistic ministry that serves the community and blends word and sacrament with advocacy and ministry in education, human rights, migrant relief, gender and economic justice, and opposition to human trafficking.

In Argentina and Uruguay, the United Evangelical Lutheran Church (IELU), is comprised of more than 10,000 members spread throughout congregations and missions in five districts. The ELCA accompanies the IELU with grants for training pastors, preventing gender-based violence and promoting sustainable livelihoods for vulnerable communities. The ELCA supports these ministries and the church at large by sending personnel, including long-term missionaries and Young Adults in Global Mission volunteers.

In Chile, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Chile (IELCH) has 3,000 members in ten congregations across the country. With the partnership of the ELCA through grants and personnel, IELCH serves its members and neighbors through education, community development and social supports with a focus on solidarity and service. In a country that experiences significant migration, primarily from Venezuela and Haiti, the ELCA partners with IELCH as they strive to be a space of response, welcome and accompaniment to those who seek a better life in Chile. For more than 40 years, ELCA World Hunger and IELCH have empowered and helped sustain *Educación* Popular en Salud (EPES), a public health organization seeking to protect and promote every Chilean's right to health, right to proper nutrition, and a life free of violence, in response to the specific needs expressed by women, people living with HIV/ AIDS and the immigrant population.

Tentative Trip Itinerary: Oct. 3-13, 2025

Oct. 3

Depart from the U.S.

Oct. 4

Morning arrival in Buenos Aires, Argentina. Meeting with the leadership of the IELU in the afternoon.

Oct. 5

Morning worship at a local congregation, followed by sightseeing and rest.

Oct. 6

Meeting with Young Adults in Global Mission country coordinator and volunteers; visit YAGM sites and justice and human rights initiatives.

Oct. 7

Visit to the Contextual Pastoral Institute and IELU ministries; meeting with International Leadership Program (ILP) scholarship recipients.

Oct. 8

Visit La Marbunta, a ministry providing support to women in situations of violence. Evening travel from Buenos Aires to Santiago, Chile.

Oct. 9

Meeting with the leadership of the IELCH; visit to a migrant ministry.

Oct. 10

Visit IELCH's ministries and the Evangelical Theological Community of Chile.

Oct. 11

Visit to EPES. Meet with ILP scholarship recipients.

Oct. 12

Worship at a local congregation, followed by sightseeing and rest. Late evening departure to the U.S.

Oct. 13

Arrive back in the U.S.
